# **Negative Declaration**

Bronx County (Bronx) - The New York State Department of Transportation (NYS DOT), as lead agency, has determined that the proposed Bruckner Expressway - Hutchinson River Parkway Mobility Improvement Project will not have a significant adverse environmental impact. The action involves the redesign of the ramps within the I-95/Pelham Parkway Interchange to reduce the number of ramp connections on northbound I-95 from Westchester Avenue to the Hutchinson River Parkway to reduce congestion, improve safety, and address geometric and operational deficiencies associated with the I-95/Pelham Parkway Interchange ramps. The project will also create a new ramp from the Hutchinson River Parkway to Bartow Avenue to provide better access to the Co-op City neighborhood and reduce congestion on local roadways. In addition to these ramp improvements, the project will improve heavily used bicycle-pedestrian paths and provide signalized crossings at all points where these paths cross highway ramps to improve the accessibility and safety of this important non-motorized travel network. The project is located in the Bronx, New York.
